1. The promise \_\_\_\_\_ : God promised to send a Savior (13:16-25).

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## Questions for the Week

1. Paul proclaims that “through this man forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to you” and that “everyone who believes is justified.” What are some ways people today try to justify themselves before God apart from Christ? How does this passage call you to rest completely in Jesus alone for salvation?
2. Paul traces God’s faithfulness throughout Israel’s history to show that God always keeps His promises. Looking at your own life, where have you seen God’s faithfulness even during difficult or confusing seasons? How does remembering God’s past faithfulness help strengthen your trust in Him today?
3. The people heard the Scriptures read every Sabbath, yet many still rejected Christ. What dangers exist in regularly hearing God’s Word without responding in faith and obedience? What practical steps can you take to cultivate a soft, responsive heart toward God’s truth?

Q 125. What does the fourth petition mean?
