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Questions for the Week

1. Paul entered Corinth after experiencing rejection, persecution, and hardship, yet God continued to provide for and sustain him. What hardships or uncertainties are you facing right now, and how does Acts 18 challenge you to look for God's faithfulness?
2. In Acts 18:9-10, God tells Paul, *"Do not be afraid... for I am with you."* Why is God's presence a greater source of confidence than having comfortable or predictable circumstances? How can this promise change the way you respond to fear or anxiety?
3. Paul remained in Corinth for eighteen months, teaching the Word, even though he faced opposition and could not see everything God was accomplishing. Where might you be tempted to give up because you are not seeing the results you hoped for? What would faithful perseverance look like in that situation?
4. God told Paul, *"I have many in this city who are my people,"* even though Paul could not see or identify all of them. How does God's sovereignty over salvation give us confidence to faithfully serve, pray, and share the gospel without feeling that the results depend entirely upon us? How might this change the way you think about your role in your family, workplace, neighborhood, or at church?

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
