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Questions for the Week

1. Where are you most tempted to “use God” for your own purposes? Are there ways you approach prayer, Scripture, ministry, or your relationship with Jesus primarily because of what you hope God will give you or accomplish for you?
2. The sons of Sceva attempted to use the name of Jesus as a spiritual formula (Acts 19:13–16). How can we fall into a similar pattern by treating Scripture as a tool for getting what we want rather than allowing God’s Word to change us? What would it look like to submit to Scripture even when it challenges your desires?
3. Paul’s ministry in Ephesus demonstrated integrity, repentance, and a desire to make the name of Jesus great (Acts 19:8–20). Which of these areas is God currently calling you to grow in? What specific change might that require in your life?
4. Acts 19:18–19 describes people publicly turning away from practices that were incompatible with following Christ. What sinful attitudes, habits, influences, or possessions might you need to put away because they compete with your allegiance to Jesus?
5. “The word of the Lord continued to increase and prevail mightily” (Acts 19:20). If God were to use your life to make the name of Jesus great this week, where would you expect to see that happen? What would bold, unashamed faithfulness look like there?

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
